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DISTRICT-BY-DISTRICT POLL: GOP VOTERS WANT A CONSERVATIVE HOUSE SPEAKER

DALLAS, Dec. 20, 2010 – In the opening round of a telephone poll of 28,980 Republican primary voters in 77 GOP-held Texas House districts, nearly 9 in 10 responding indicated they want the State House led by a Speaker more conservative than the previous Legislature's choice, Joe Straus III.

"No matter which GOP district we poll, we find none where the Representative can credibly claim that his supporters want a moderate Speaker," Michael Smith, Executive Vice President of Heritage Alliance, said.

Heritage Alliance polled an average of 376 1R households per State House district. Of those, an average of 336 per district responded in favor of a more-conservative House Speaker.

"Contrary to the 'no labels' idea floated at a New York press conference last week, Texas Republicans seem to think 'conservative' is a winning brand," Smith added. "That may explain why Joe Straus calls himself a conservative at every opportunity, despite his decidedly non-conservative voting record."

In no GOP district can the Representative credibly claim his supporters want a moderate Speaker In the last session in which Straus was a full voting member, his score in the Heritage Alliance Conservative Report ranked lowest among currently serving House Republicans—52 percent. The other two declared candidates for Speaker, Rep. Warren Chisum (R.-Pampa) and Rep. Ken Paxton (R.-McKinney), scored 89 and 91 percent, respectively, in the same session.

A similar gap in scores between the incumbent Speaker and challengers was documented by two other Texas conservative groups, Eagle Forum and Young Conservatives of Texas.

In the Heritage Alliance telephone poll, voters who responded affirmatively to the question, "If you want a true conservative Republican as Speaker of the Texas House, press 1," were offered an opportunity to contact their State Representative (or Representative-Elect) via the Heritage Alliance web site.

This concludes Heritage Alliance's initial round of polling on the Speaker's contest. Twenty-two calendar days remain until the Speaker's election, the opening day of the 82nd Legislature.
